A Note from Father on Daily Mass this Summer

You know the experience: the day gets moving like a speeding train that's impossible to stop. At the end of the day your head is spinning with unfinished to-dos, and you recognize with a sadness you spent most of the whirlwind of a day without stopping to turn to the Father. How many days in a row do we live like this? Modern man, including priests, struggle with trying to live beyond our natural limits as creatures. We are not God. We can't do everything. We can't help everyone. There are only a certain number of hours in the day--thanks be to God.

This Lent, we celebrated our regular daily Mass at noon. It forced me to stop and turn to the Father. More than anything in my seven years of priesthood, the noon Mass helped me live at a human pace, with a deeper awareness and trust in the Father. My spiritual director and parish council encouraged me to try the noon Mass for a few more months. I like the 8am Mass and am still attracted to that time, but this summer, we will continue to celebrate Mass at noon Tuesday-Friday.

Think about how inconvenient or difficult it is to stop midday. For this very reason, I propose try going to a noon Mass throughout the week. This summer, consider bringing the kids to a daily Mass once a week. Of course, I understand it is impossible for many due to their employer's set hours. Daily Mass is not a requirement for sanctification, as Sunday Mass is a requirement. Before Lent and during Lent, 15 parishioners, give or take, are able to participate in daily Mass. Regardless, every day of the week, Jesus and I offer the Sacrifice of the Mass to the Father in intercession for you, the hundreds of members of the parish family. If you can't or simply choose not to come to daily Mass, remember the beloved painting of the Angelus in your grandma's kitchen: a man and woman stopping their work in the field for one little moment to turn to our Father and beg our Lady for help.
